Happy New Year!

We're starting off 2020 with a brand new episode of Let's Have a Conversation. Bob Friend was able to sit with attendees at the Kempe Center's International Conference on Innovations in Family Engagement and discuss a number of topics. This episode yields a conversation with experienced leaders of two organizations who have helped to install and sustain family involvement practices in their agencies in Hawaii and Minnesota, in partnership with their local public counterparts, so that families can have primary authorship over the plans and results in matters involving their kin who may be or have entered the child welfare system. A second episode will soon follow which contains interviews/perspectives with these leaders and other attendees about the greatest need for changes in child welfare, and plans that the participants have to make an impact in their communities.

The Quality Improvement Center for Adoption and Guardianship Support and Preservation (QIC-AG) has completed a five year project working with 8 sites to implement effective interventions to promote stable permanence in adoptive and guardianship homes. One of the interventions selected was Pathways to Permanency 2, which is a parent training series designed by Kinship Center-Seneca Family of Agencies, for adoptive, foster, and kinship/guardianship families. Its goal is to help families support children in the Permanent Managing Conservatorship of Texas to address issues of trauma, grief, and loss and build healthy attachments and lasting relationships. 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Quality Improvement Center for Adoption & Guardianship Support and Preservation



The National Quality Improvement Center for Adoption and Guardianship Support and Preservation (QIC-AG) is a five-year project working with eight sites (Catawba County, N.C.; Illinois; New Jersey; Tennessee; Texas; Vermont; Winnebago Tribe, NE; Wisconsin) that will implement evidence-based interventions or develop and test promising practices which, if proven effective, can be replicated or adapted in other child welfare jurisdictions.

The Texas QIC-AG project aims to help children in the Permanent Managing Conservatorship (PMC) of Texas address issues resulting from trauma, grief, and loss by using an interactive series for caregiver families that focuses on parenting children who have trauma and loss as a part of their history.

They are making progress by implementing Pathways to Permanence 2: Parenting Children Who Have Experienced Trauma and Loss (Pathways 2), one of two parent training series designed by Kinship Center, a member of Seneca Family of Agencies, for adoptive, foster, and kinship/guardianship families. Pathways to Permanence 1: Parenting in Real Life is designed to prepare prospective adoptive and foster care parents. Pathways 2 is designed for foster and adoptive parents, kinship caregivers, and guardians who are actively parenting children who have experienced trauma and loss. Pathways 2 is a seven-session series that uses a group-based format to enhance parents' and caregivers' ability in skilled application of strategies. The program is designed as a clinically informed competency-building training, and is delivered as an interactive learning experience with robust discussion. The Texas QIC-AG site page includes an <u>Overview</u> of the overall QIC-AG project and the chosen intervention by the Texas chapter, how Texas is <u>Implementing</u> as well as recruitment and retention efforts, <u>Lessons Learned</u> throughout the process, and finally a <u>Video</u> that chronicles the sites implementation journey and highlight the personal impact of providing the intervention to children and families.
